The Protection of Nature and the Environment in Southeast Europe: Players, Discourses, Strategies of Action

Background

In the wider region of Southeast Europe the notion of nature is connected with various attributions of meaning which are at least partly rooted in history: Nature is perceived, framed and treated as an esthetical symbol, an economically important resource, a cultural heritage and as a value which is also of importance for the sense of national identities. In the former socialist countries of the region environmental activism and the positive commitment to nature draw considerable symbolic power from the pro-democracy mobilizations of the socialist past. Today, demands for the protection of nature and the environment are brought forward in manifold public discussion forums and spheres of negotiation. Political and economic actors, "green" parties, social movements and different forms of social self-organizations take an active part in public discourses concerning environmentally relevant attributions of meanings and concerning the use and the management of natural resources. These discourses take place in a complex field of tension among European and national legal environmental obligations, (power) political calculation and maneuvering, demands for economic growth, efficiency and competitiveness and social relationships to nature. Frequently they reveal important political and social cleavages and far-reaching conflicts and competitions of interests and demands.

Concept

In the course of the International University Week we will consider environmentally-relevant fields of action and spheres of negotiation with their inherent conflicting goals and competitions of interests. We will pay particular attention to the political and nonstate key players which struggle for the power of interpretation in environmentally-relevant information and decision-making processes. In this context it is essential to grasp and to analyze their problem constructions and patterns of action and interpretation.

It will be important to discuss the following questions (amongst others):

- How are relevant key terms (nature, environment, ecology, sustainability...) framed in local and national discourses? Which everyday cultural meanings of these terms can be grasped? Which role do these interpretative patterns play for environmental policies and for everyday life?
- In how far do local volunteer work and social commitment on the local level represent social resources of relevance for the protection of nature and the environment and which ideas, values and motivations sharp the concepts of nature in this sphere of action?
- Which problem definitions and attributions of responsibility do the framings of environmentally relevant actors reflect? Which social and political cleavages and formal and informal power constellations become obvious?
- What impact do professionalized national and supra-national environmental associations and networks really have?
- Which ambiguities concerning the capacity to act and the legitimacy of various political and nonstate actors can be detected?
- Last but not least it is important to identify in how far European funds and other EU initiatives really complement regional and national strategies.

In conclusion we should be able to discuss

- Whether and in how far specific "western" and "southeastern" discourses regarding environmentally-relevant developments, challenges and priorities of action need to be distinguished
- Whether and in how far local informal interest groups and social movements maybe even represent a "southeastern" counterpart to western-shaped, institutionalized and formalized concepts of political ecology.

The event is aimed at promoting scientific discussions and international networking of scientists carrying out analytical work on the subject. The International University Week addresses students, researchers and scientists from various disciplines (especially from Sociology, Political Science, Cultural Studies, Media and Communication Studies, History, Economic Sciences, International Relations, Environmental Sciences, Peace and Conflict Studies etc.) from east and west.
