Course Objectives: Understanding Euro-Atlantic integration law within the system of contemporary international legal order.

#### **Expected learning outcomes:**

Interpret and explain the idea of European unification and the development of European integration from its historical beginnings to the present, including the enlargement policy; Describe modern international organizations and the forms of institutionalization of international relations, treaty-making capacities of international organizations, and the specificities of the accession process, especially within the European Union, as a unique, supranational organization *sui generis*; Properly understand the conditions that represent an analysis of the institutional structure of the Union, as defined by the Treaty on the European Union and the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union, with significant amendments introduced through the Lisbon Reform Treaty; Analyze the complexity of the current EU accession process and the chronology of Montenegro's European integration process, which began in the mid-1960s; Work independently in relevant institutions and civil society organizations.
