Aims	Introducing students to the system of legal norms that regulate the legal position and mutual relations of states and international organizations. Acquiring advanced knowledge of international legal order and its relationship with national law, and its individual branches.			
Learning outcomes	After passing the exam, students gained knowledge of the foundations of public international law: fundamental concepts, sources of law and basic legal institutes. Students gained insight into the origin and development of international law. They can: explain the relationship between international and national law; define and analyze subjects of international law - states and international organizations; analyze the relationship of international law towards individuals, and the international protection of human rights and its mechanisms; analyze the sources and define and explain the basic institutes of other important areas of international public law - diplomatic and consular law, law of the sea, international humanitarian law, international criminal law.
